St Margaret's Church

When it is working, we all take it for granted, when it is not we all miss it. As you will have observed the clock in the tower of St. Margaret's Church has stopped, the pendulum no longer swings and the hours no longer chime. Examinations by two independent horological engineers have ascertained the fault and work will commence in July to repair the clock mechanism in the bell tower of the church. As it will be necessary to remove the minute and hour hands, we will take the opportunity to refurbish the clock face and hands at the same time, last refurbished in the mid 1980's. Repairs to the stone weather 'eyebrow' above the clock face will take place at the same time. This will necessitate the use of scaffolding and we would therefore ask you to be vigilant when using the footpaths that run close by during this time. The work is expected to take approximately six weeks to complete.

For those new to the village, we do have a Neighbourhood Watch group within the village with six village based coordinators, each covering a designated area. Anyone is welcome to join the group and indeed we would encourage you to do so. All that we ask is that you provide us with your email address (or telephone number/address) so when the coordinators receive any relevant information from the Lincolnshire Police, we can then forward this information on to you. Sometimes this information might be about national internet scams and fraudulent emails which people should be aware of or sometimes it might be about criminal activity which might be operating in the Wolds area and armed with this information, it gives you the opportunity to take steps to keep yourself and your property safe. We ask nothing else of you other than if ever you see or hear of anything suspicious within our community and you do not wish to report it yourself, report it to your coordinator who might be able to advise or report the incident/matter on your behalf. It is a known fact that criminals are deterred from their criminal activity if they know that an area has a neighbourhood watch group. Our signs at each road entrance to the village tells them we care about our village and our community.

If you would like to join the NHW Group and you are unsure which coordinator oversees your area, then please email me on winter52@btinternet.com and I will make sure the appropriate coordinator receives your information and introduces themselves to you so you know who your coordinator is.

Please keep your eyes and ears open as you walk about the village and take notice if you see anything you think may be suspicious, especially at this time of the year when some residents might be away on holiday. If you are going on holiday, perhaps just let your neighbour or a friend know so they can keep an eye on your home whilst you are away.

Heritage Open Days 7th—10th September

Heritage Open Days celebrate England's architecture and culture by allowing visitors free access to interesting properties that are not usually publicly accessible or would normally charge a fee. It also includes tours, events and activities that focus on and celebrate the local heritage of the area. Heritage Open Days is England's biggest and most popular voluntary cultural event and is also held in a further 48 countries across Europe.

Ever since 1994 Heritage Lincolnshire has co-ordinated Heritage Open Days within the historic county. So far there have been well over a thousand events and hundreds of thousands of visitors. But they couldn't do it without their volunteers, as hundreds of people each year give their time to plan events and open up special places that matter to them.

This year's festival will be one of our biggest yet, with over 140 free events! The theme is **Freedom, Justice & Equality** to mark the 800th anniversary of the Charter of the Forest, a copy of which is held alongside Magna Carta at Lincoln Castle. This lesser known charter restored the historic rights and freedoms of common people to gather fuel, food and graze their animals in royal forests across the kingdom. So look out for events celebrating hard won freedoms, historic crimes and cruel punishments. Village Clean Up

On behalf of the parish council we would like to say a big thank you to Julian for organising the first village clean up for this year. Also to all the residents who turned out to assist and to the villagers who pick up litter as they walk around the highways and byways. As indicated previously Julian has suggested that this event should take place twice yearly. We have therefore set a date of Saturday 9th September when we will meet once again at the village hall at 2pm with suitable attire for the weather conditions. Julian is again arranging the necessary equipment needed to carry out this task.

Operation Rogue Trader Week 2017

Lincolnshire Trading Standards and Lincolnshire Police have again this year been working together to crack down on rogue trading in the County. Operation Rogue Trader is a national campaign which ran from 8 to 12 May and is designed to coordinate the country's efforts in stamping out rogue trading and raising awareness of the issue. Rogue traders con vulnerable people by overcharging, doing unnecessary work, damaging property deliberately and leaving work unfinished. They use intimidating behaviour in order to extort money like insisting on taking a customer to an ATM for payment.

The national week of action involves agencies responsible for tackling this area of criminality going out in partnership to engage and enforce against rogue trading. Educating communities to enable them to spot and protect themselves from rogue trading was a key part of the activity. The advice to anyone with concerns about an unsolicited caller is "Not sure? Don't open the door!"

Alongside the engagement, enforcement activity was carried out to crack down on offenders and send the clear message, that rogue trading will not be tolerated in the county. Local and specialist officers were deployed with Trading Standards throughout the week in communities across Lincolnshire. Over 30 vehicles were checked and several offences were detected at the roadside. Checks have been made on over 40 traders during this period sending out the clear message that rogue traders will be actively targeted. Last year in the East Midlands region, Operation Rogue Trader saw targeted delivery of over 3 ½ thousand leaflets to engage with vulnerable people, 253 vehicles stop checked, 199 offences identified and 19 arrests made.

Local Policing Inspector Phil Baker said, "Our job is to pursue those responsible for rogue trading and disrupt their activity. Operation Rogue Trader Week gives us a chance to really focus on and highlight this area but it is something that remains a top priority for us throughout the year. Rogue traders can be incredibly convincing and draw people into believing they are legitimate, but they also make a point of targeting the most vulnerable members of our communities – people they believe they can trick or bully.

"There is evidence to link rogue trading to distraction burglary so it is important we educate people on the tactics they use so they can be on their guard. If residents have heard about the techniques they use, they are in a better position to protect themselves and their families and neighbours".

Sally Gray, senior trading standards officer said, "Tracking down and catching these rogue traders is an absolute priority for Lincolnshire County Council's Trading Standards teams. The doorstep traders usually target the elderly and vulnerable, and use high pressure methods to persuade them to have work done. They often overcharge and provide misleading statements about the work they offer, leaving householders out of pocket and facing more bills to put problems right.

"Working with our partners, including Lincolnshire Police and HMRC, we are committed to working together to tackle this issue and will take appropriate enforcement action against those involved".

Please call 101 if you have any concerns about rogue trading or you have information you would like to pass on. In an emergency, call 999. If you are concerned about unwanted callers in general please contact your neighbourhood policing team who can give you advice and one of our signs to say that you do not do business at the door.

Did you know? Unused prescription medicines cost the NHS in the UK an estimated £300 million every year.

This could pay for;

11778 more Community Nurses or 19,799 more drug treatment courses for breast cancer or 80,906 more hip replacements or 300,000 more drug treatment courses for Alzheimer's or 312,175 more cataract operations.

How can you help?

Please let your GP or Pharmacist know if you've stopped taking any of your medicines and check what medicines you have at home before re-ordering. Think carefully before ticking all the boxes on your repeat prescription forms and only tick those you really need. Please also remember that your medicines are prescribed only for you; it is not safe to share them with anyone else. Even if you never open them, once medicines have left the Pharmacy, they cannot be recycled or used by anyone else. **Please take your unused medicines to a Pharmacy for safe disposal**
