Changes in the way to Apply for Bus Passes

Recent changes have been made in the way that eligible Lincolnshire residents can apply for free travel passes mean that they can now apply in three different ways. As from April 2018 applications can be made by downloading an application form from www.lincolnshire.gov.uk/concessionaryfares. A new web portal will also allow some applicants to apply online. Alternatively you can apply by post and the new address for postal applications is Concessionary Fares Team, PO Box 1305, Lincoln, LN5 5RT. Or you can pre-book a face to face appointment by calling 01522 550129 although these appointments will no longer be held at City Hall in Lincoln but at Crown House in Grantham Street. Also as part of these changes they no longer have the facility to take photographs either.

However it is worth noting that concessionary bus passes can be used on the CallConnect Bus Service and also nationally although some different conditions can apply depending on which local authority area you are travelling in.

Residents can access the transport helpline on 01522 550129 for any questions or queries regarding their application. They can also request information and advice about how to get the best from their pass and make the most of bus travel in Lincolnshire. The helpline is open Monday to Friday 9.30am – 5.30pm and Saturday, 10am – 3pm.

CallConnect Bus Service - Community Tour

The following information has been received from Hayley Wiblin from Connect Lincolnshire who is a Transport Assistant and gives us a real opportunity to learn more about this fantastic service which is already used by some residents.

I just wanted to let you know that during the national Catch the Bus Week campaign, Lincolnshire's rural bus service, CallConnect, will be undertaking a community tour visiting more than 50 communities in Lincolnshire. As part of the community tour I am pleased to let you know that your parish has been selected as one of the villages that we will be visiting. Catch the Bus week runs from July 2nd – July 8th and we will be promoting CallConnect and the benefits of rural bus travel.

Throughout the week, we will be arriving at villages that are served by CallConnect in a bus packed with information and advice of how to make the most of this vital rural service. As well as meeting as many members of the public as we can, we are going to deliver literature and publicity items, such as posters, to key hubs in your community. We look forward to seeing as many people as possible so we are able to promote this unique rural service.

Due to the number of villages they are visiting on the tour they will be arriving in Hemingby for a brief visit on Thursday 5th July from 1.45pm - 2.15pm. The Village Hall Committee have kindly agreed to open the hall to facilitate this, so why not come along and have a cuppa and a chat.



Lincoln Park & Ride

Another service that has been proving very popular is Lincoln Park & Ride is a collaboration project by Visit Lincoln and Stagecoach East Midlands. The Park & Ride in Lincoln allows those travelling by car from the North of Lincoln to park for free in Waitrose and continue to the city centre by bus. This means you don't have to worry about finding a space to park in the city centre. The Park & Ride bus can take you back to Waitrose after you have finished your day in Lincoln.

You don't have to travel by car or park in Waitrose; anyone is welcome to use the Park & Ride service. Fares and details are Adults £2.50, Children Free and concessionary bus pass holders free after 9.30am on weekdays.

You can find this service at Bus Stand C at the [Bus Station in Lincoln](#) or at Waitrose as well as intermediate stops as shown on the timetable which can be downloaded from their website at <https://lincolnbus.co.uk/special-services/lincoln-park-and-ride>.



AGE UK Befriending Service

AGE UK offers two different types of befriending service should any residents wish to avail themselves of this service.

Face to Face befriending: where a volunteer befriender visits an older person in their home, perhaps for a cup of tea and a chat, or accompanies them to an activity (such as a trip to a café or the theatre). In some cases, a volunteer may accompany the older person to occasional hospital or doctor's appointments.

Telephone befriending: where a volunteer befriender will phone an older person at an agreed time for a chat.

With both types of befriending each older person is matched with a befriender who has similar interests. They will provide friendly conversation and companionship on a regular basis over a long period of time. Befriending provides an older person with a link to the outside world and often acts as a gateway for other services and valuable support. These services are usually free of charge. Interested? Wolds Walkers for Health (Hemingby)

The group continues to meet each Tuesday morning at 9.30 am outside the Village Hall for a walk around the Village using both public and permitted footpaths. These walks usually last around 45 minutes and anyone is welcome to join us on our health walk. The walks are free and you don't need to pre-register, you can just turn up on the morning as and when you like.

The Walking for Health programme is supported in this area by the Lincolnshire Co-op who will shortly be sending out (via the various walking groups) a Health Walks leaflet that they have compiled for the East Lindsey area which details all of the walks which take place regularly in the area under the Walking for Health banner. These leaflets will be distributed in due course to you all, so please look out for them as you may know some of the faces on the leaflet! By knowing where and when other walking groups are operating, you can choose when and where you can go walking and is a good way of seeing an unfamiliar area in a social walking group which is led by a trained volunteer walk leader. So if you fancy a walk around Woodhall Spa, Skegness or perhaps Sutton on Sea for a change, then you only have to turn up at the allotted time and place to walk with the group. For example, here in the Hemingby walking group we have permission to use some permitted footpaths which would not normally be open to the public, so it is a good opportunity to see places which you might not see otherwise. The Lincolnshire Co-op is producing leaflets for all areas of Lincolnshire, not just East Lindsey, should you wish to have a day out further afield and get to know an area a little better on foot.

Walking regularly is proven to be good for your health and wellbeing and walking in a group with friends is a good social activity. I can assure everyone there has never been a silent walk in Hemingby!

Please note however that the weekly village walks DO NOT take place during August but recommence on Tuesday 4th September at 9.30 am.

The Group also runs a monthly longer walk around the Wolds area on the first Thursday of each month and this walk is usually around four miles in length and takes around 90 minutes to complete, terrain dependent! The walk on Thursday 5th July is a circular walk around Winceby via Hameringham and will, as always be led by Bill Goodall. Walkers are asked to meet outside Hemingby Village Hall at 10 am when a car sharing system will operate to the start point at the Nature Reserve car park at Winceby (not Snipedales main car park) for a 10.30 am start. If you should you have any questions regarding this walk, then please contact Bill on 01507 578650 on the morning of the walk between 9 – 10 am.

Unlike the weekly walks, the monthly walks do continue in August and the walk in August will be a circular walk around Belchford, again starting from Hemingby Village Hall at 10 am. Then in September our monthly walk will be a circular walk around Wragby & Goltho.

It is now ten years since Hemingby joined the Neighbourhood Watch system and recently we have been informed of the resignation (due to leaving the Village) of Karen Ward who during all of that time has been the Co-coordinator for the bottom end of New End. Karen, ever since the formation of the group here in Hemingby, has always been an enthusiastic supporter who has contributed greatly at both co-coordinator meetings and neighbourhood watch events in the village and so will be sorely missed by those she 'worked' alongside. We thank her for her support for our community over the past ten years and wish her well in her new home.

This however does now leave a gap in our communication network around the village and so I would send out an appeal for anyone living (or about to live!) in New End who would like to become a co-coordinator for the bottom end of New End. The task is not too onerous, especially if you have access to computer technology. Communications are sent to you by Lincolnshire Police and the national Neighbourhood Watch organisation and these can then be forwarded onto the members in your allotted area, mainly through the email system whenever possible. You would also be the first point of contact in your 'patch' should anyone wish to report anything suspicious or seek advice. If you feel you could take on this valuable community role, then please contact me either by email (winter52@btinternet.com) or telephone and I will arrange for your details to be given to Lincolnshire Police.

Summer is here! Remember warmer weather means open windows and doors – before you go out make sure they are all closed or at least on the secure partial openings. 100 Club

Please be aware that August will see the renewal of membership of this fundraising club that the Play Area launched at the last church fete. Although many people signed up using a Standing Order Mandate we are required to ask if you wish to continue with your membership. Recent changes in the data protection act mean that we need your permission to hold your details on file. For this reason we will be issuing reminders which will include your membership number and a copy of a Standing Order Mandate should you need one and wish to renew using this convenient method. All reminders will be issued at the beginning of July and we would like you to confirm your membership by the end of that month. This gives us the opportunity to invite new members during August in the unlikely event that we have any spare places. By the end of August we would have issued prize money totaling £1200 and raised the same in much needed funds. We would like to thank all members for their continued support, your generosity really does make a huge difference.

History

For the last few months, Hemingby History Group has been working with archaeologist Dave Start to discover the ancient past of Hemingby and to learn techniques for carrying out archaeological survey and recording. We have studied aerial photographs, Lidar plots and all the Hemingby entries in the county's Historic Environment record to help us to understand the development of the village. We found that there are many records of Stone Age implements found to the south of New End and considerable quantities of Roman pottery and building materials in the north of the parish. We can see that the medieval village centre with its village green was originally up by the old Manor House near Bain Valley Cottages.

One of the techniques that we learnt about was archaeological fieldwalking - This involves walking in measured lines across a ploughed field looking for, and picking up, the rubbish that was dropped many centuries ago. About ten of us tried this out on a field near Hemingby Lane in early April, with Dave supervising. Although we were all new to the technique we did find a range of pottery and worked flint that will be sent away to a specialist for accurate identification. In all we picked up (and carefully washed!) thirty-four pieces of Medieval (or earlier) pottery, and twelve pieces of more modern pottery. We also collected sixteen pieces of flint which may have been worked by the Prehistoric inhabitants of Hemingby. We will know more when the pottery and flint has been analysed.

Hemingby has a fascinating past from Prehistoric to post-Medieval and there's a lot more to find out.

2017/18 Events:

In doing so, we were able to raise profits of £172.50 as well as provide more attractions for visitors to the event. We were also able to launch the 100 Club at this event and banked £792 from the day signing up a third of the members.

3/9/17 – September meeting saw the draw of our first 100 club. This is a monthly lottery draw which will raise £1200 annually for the Play Area fund as well as provide £100 monthly prize money to be split between three winning members each month.

16/9/17 – Doughty's Fabric Sale – This is an event which we share with the Village Hall Committee. Very simply, we provide man power to unload/reload material before and after the event as well as provide refreshments and take an entry fee. This year, profits for the Play Area were £257.20.

21/10/17 – Race Night – Now a bi-annual event (to alternate with our bi-annual fete), this popular evening raised a staggering £910.98; special thanks to Joy and Doug's son-in-law for hosting this fabulous evening for us.

3/12/17 – This year saw the return of the 'non-profit making' Traditional Children's Christmas Party with games, crafts, food and Santa. It was a lovely event to offer and very much enjoyed by everyone who attended. It has been agreed to make this an annual event.

1/4/18 – Easter Egg Hunt – intended to be another non-profit making event for the youngsters, we were delighted to receive an unexpected donation of £57 from the Easter Breakfast event, who felt that the addition of the hunt made their event better attended and more enjoyable. Again, we will make this an annual event.

1/4/18 – Easter Egg Raffle at the Coach and Horses raised a fabulous £125 and has been a mainstay of fundraising for many years.

23/4/18 – The annual fashion show was more successful this year with approximately 65 seats sold and with the majority of ladies turning up for it, the atmosphere was both fun and lively. Profits raised totalled £371.80

In Summary as reported at the Annual Parish Meeting:

Thank you to everyone who has supported us this year it is very much appreciated whether it has been through attending events, helping to run them, buying raffle ticks and/ or 100 club tickets, etc. your support is very much appreciated.

The Committee is in good fettle.

The play area ground has not been in as good a condition as we would like, mostly due to the wet weather which has been out of the control of the committee.

The Committee recently bought a new mower as now the grass cutting will be done by committee members and volunteers.

The equipment however has been cleaned and the paintwork will be touched up now that the weather has improved.

The play area ground and equipment is checked weekly during the summer months (fortnightly over winter) by committee members to ensure that the facilities remain safe which enables any problems to be fixed immediately.

Lots of positive comments are regularly received about the play area from visitors and regular users and the committee are very proud of the facility.

The committee is financially in a good place with a healthy bank balance.

New committee members are always welcome to join at any time and are encouraged to do so.

Finally, special thanks to all the committee. They are a good bunch of people who give up their time freely to look after the facilities and organise / hold events to raise money for the constant upkeep.

In Memory of Tony Carroll

5th October 1944 - 15th May 2018

Tony was born Joseph Anthony Carroll in Drogheda, County Armagh in Ireland, the eldest of three children and lived in an idyllic, rural countryside setting which depended on beef and sheep farming. In his twenties, a lack of secure employment meant a job at RAF Halton in Aylesbury, first as a steward, and then as a lathe operator. Whilst he was there, he met Gloria and began a courtship that led to a 54-year marriage and two sons.

After living in Hemel Hempstead for twenty years or so, Tony and Gloria moved here, to Lincolnshire and the beautiful rolling countryside of Hemingby, creating a working, profitable farm and an amazingly rich social life with the good people of the village and beyond. Tony's first love was farming and it filled his heart with joy to stand at the top of a field and simply breathe the air. As a tribute to him this beautiful poem was read at his funeral.

Close the gate

For this one farmer the worries are over, lie down and rest your head,
Your time has been and struggled enough, put the tractor in the shed.
You raised a fine family, worked the land well, and at days end won,
Hang up your shovel inside of the barn; your work here on earth is done.
