Foreword

One of the difficulties of living in this technological age is that hardly a day goes by without hearing something on the news about scamming, hacking or peoples personal details being stolen electronically. For a person who admits to being a complete technophobe I find this very disconcerting as my lack of knowledge means I am never absolutely sure that my computer or other devices are fully protected. Even if they are, it would appear that there is always some unscrupulous people who are trying to overcome my anti virus software. A recent communication from Royal Mail to our Parish Clerk covers the subject of scam mail which is illegal and targets the most vulnerable in society. It can be anyone, you, a relative or a friend or neighbour who receives this type of mail. Royal Mail advises us they are doing everything they can to protect their customers but there is a limit to what they can do. They have to date proactively stopped over 4 million suspected pieces of mail leaving their distribution centres around the U.K. They further advise that should you be concerned that someone you know is in receipt of scam mail they should contact them by calling their helpline on 0800 0113 466; writing to them at FREEPOST SCAM MAIL, or emailing scam.mail@royalmail.com.

Sadly, it is a fact of life that we must be vigilant and not respond to anything we are not sure of. I am pleased to report that recently an item of mail which raised the suspicion of one of our residents was reported to me and I was able to allay their fears and reassure them that the action they had taken was sufficient to protect them. Please, please question anything you are not sure of in the knowledge that many people have to ask these questions every day.

Talking about computers and anti virus software leads me very nicely into a link regarding our own anti virus protection and a recent warning by the Director of Public Health that this year we could all face a Flu Pandemic. I therefore make no apology for mentioning this again in my foreword when we have also covered it in an article in this publication. It is absolutely vital that if at all possible, vulnerable or not, we should take the opportunity of the protection that vaccination affords us. Many people each year die as a result of contracting the flu virus and yet ,even if you cannot get a free jab, about £10 to £12 will protect you and is available from high street pharmacies as well as the doctors.

Finally, I would like to thank all the members of the Play Area Committee 100 club who signed up for membership for the second year. I am pleased to report that 96% of members signed up again raising valuable funds for this important facility as well as giving you a chance to win a prize. With others wanting to join, the selling of the four spare places was made easy for us. Should you wish to be put on a waiting list for next year if we have any vacancies then please don't hesitate to contact me and I can keep a list.

Lincolnshire Day Sunday 1st October

The day marks the anniversary of Lincolnshire Rising, a Catholic revolt against Henry VIII and the Church of England on October 1, 1536.

Lincoln Castle, Lincoln Cathedral and The Collection and Usher Gallery are just some of the county's attractions that are opening their doors free of charge on Sunday, October 1 for the celebrations.

People are recommended to dress in yellow as many businesses dress their shops with all things Lincolnshire.

What is a Yellowbelly?

A Yellowbelly is a person who is native to the glorious county of Lincolnshire. This is, of course, different to yellow-belly, which means a coward in most places! There are as many theories about the origins of this term as there are Yellowbellies' themselves. Here are just some of the wonderful theories about where it comes from.

The Lincolnshire Regiment wore yellow waistcoats as part of their uniform and their nickname was then used for anyone from the county. According to the Sealed Knot Society, officers directing the Lincolnshire troops in the civil war, wore yellow sashes in battle.

Much of the county was fenland and under water - draining the fens started with the Romans and was still in progress in the 19th Century. As a consequence, many of the Yellowbelly theories are related to our watery past.

Before the fens were drained, many residents suffered from a malaria-like illness. One theory has it that the illness caused jaundice, which makes the skin go yellow, and another that the remedy caused the same effect.

Lincolnshire's fen dwelling ancestors were susceptible to developing a yellow fungus on their stomachs in damp weather. The fenland mud was said to be yellow - colouring the bellies of poachers as they stalked game.

The Lincolnshire stagecoaches travelling to York and London, and back, were painted yellow, according to another theory, so that the mud wouldn't show.

The fertile drained soil was used to grow mustard, giving us another theory that the crop stained the aprons of the farm workers giving them and the resident sheep a yellow belly.

Finally, the rural deaneries in the diocese of Lincoln still use the names they had when they were Saxon wapentakes. The fen area was Elloe Bellie or Ye Elloe Bellie - which might roughly translate to "out of the boggy hole" and which may well have spread in usage, so that Lincolnshire people became known as Yellowbellies' ".

Of course this may only be some of the many theories on this subject, should you have one of your own the history group would love to hear from you.

Job Description: To be able to forward onto group members in your 'patch', the communications received from Lincolnshire Police and associated partners. This can be either by email, telephone or handwritten note. Attend occasional meeting of village coordinators.

Remuneration: Gratitude from those villagers who receive your communications.

If you would like to know more about the 'job' then please contact any one of the village Neighbourhood Watch Coordinators, who will be only too pleased to let you know how it all works. If you would like to 'apply/volunteer' for the job, then please contact Janet Winter who will be able to set the ball in motion.

Finally, we have been receiving some information from the Police regarding door to door sales persons who have been knocking on doors with bags of merchandise for sale. This is a known distraction technique used by some to commit distraction thefts and reports have been received from both Horncastle and Minting. Never invite such people into your home and be aware of the whereabouts of any persons accompanying the salesman.

If you have someone attend your address unannounced, please remember to consider using a chain (if fitted) or speaking to them through closed doors.

There are people who legitimately sell door to door and they hold the relevant peddler's certificates, however sadly, there are those who use the practice to commit crime so please all remain vigilant and pass on the advice to any vulnerable neighbours and family.

It is now believed the men have left the area, however we must remain vigilant and informed a very good reason to join the Hemingby Neighbourhood Watch Group, if you have not already done so. New members are always welcome as we strive to protect and inform our community, so please contact any of the village coordinators if you wish to join the group.



Donington on Bain & Surrounding Villages

On the 14th May this year Lincolnshire County Council approved an extension to planning permission allowing Egdon Resources PLC to drill a conventional oil well at Biscathorpe located in an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty north of Donington on Bain. The process may last up to 3 years during which time the site monitoring will be conducted by a third party, not directly by the Environment Agency. A group of village residents are conducting a survey to gauge local opinion regarding this development in the Lincolnshire Wolds. Poppies

My name is Julian Millington and I have the honour of being the Chairman Of Horncastle and District Royal British Legion.

This email is to bring to your attention the events that are being planned, as both a celebration and in remembrance of the fact that this year marks 100 years since the end of The Great War. It is generic email I am sending to all Parish Councils in my Poppy Appeal area.

On Friday 9th November, Banovallum Brass will hold a concert at Stanhope Hall, Horncastle which will include a Drumhead Service and music to celebrate 100 years since the formation of the RAF. There will be memorials to those who lost their lives in The Great War and a Royal British Legion stall.

Events are being planned both in the Market Place, Horncastle and The Red Lion Theatre Horncastle for the day on Saturday 10th November. These too will be remembrance events.

On Sunday 11th November, the usual Parade and Church Service will be held culminating in a minute's silence and laying of wreaths at Horncastle War Memorial Hospital. Refreshments will then be available in a marquee in the war memorial hospital car park at midday there will be a short service in Hammerton Gardens to remember the Korean Veterans.

During the evening there will be an event at Scrivelsby Estate. At 7pm throughout the country, beacons will be lit, and bells rung to mark the end of The Great War. Scrivelsby has been selected as one of these locations. There will be food and drink, fireworks and the beacon lighting.

The events described above are being organised by a committee of several local organisations, led by Horncastle Town Council.

As a show of remembrance, I would like to invite all councils to display large poppies in their Villages for the remembrance period. Some of you may have seen them displayed in West Ashby last year. They are suitable for attaching to lampposts, street lights or similar places. They come with plastic ties to attach to the relevant post. They are £3 each and can be ordered through me. This is not a sales pitch, but the more that are displayed the more noticeable they are. I hope you feel able to support this initiative.

CCTV & GDPR

With the recent introduction of the new General Data Protection Regulations (GDPR) we felt it was important to make residents aware of the regulations governing the installation and use of Close Circuit Television (CCTV).

Under the Data Protection Act, domestic CCTV will be exempt from the data protection principles unless you are capturing footage of individuals outside the boundaries of your property. If any camera attached to a private individual's home covers even partially, a public space such as a pavement or a street, or captures areas such as a neighbour's gardens it will no longer be exempt. Should your CCTV cameras monitor any area beyond the interior or exterior limits of your home then you will need to register your use with the Information Commissioner's Office at a cost of £35.00 per year. Further advice has been given regarding the processing and disclosure of personal data in relation to CCTV footage i.e. the justification for householders collecting and using personal data and CCTV footage that may assist to identify offenders is that it is necessary for the purposes of the prevention or detection of an unlawful act This information should only be shared with the police or another relevant law enforcement body such as a local authority in the case of flytipping.

It is strongly recommended that householders do not share information on social media or by other means otherwise this could jeopardize any police investigation or subsequent legal action.

Battery Recycling

Another recent fire in a recycling plant reminded us that we had seen an article recently outlining the problems caused by not disposing of batteries correctly. So we thought it would be a good idea to reproduce it as a reminder of the danger involved. There is a temptation to think we can lump all recycling together but clearly that is not the case.

Members of the public have been urged by the Health and Safety Executive (HSE) to use recycling points for disposing of batteries. The call to use recycling points comes in the wake of fires in household waste and recycling collection vehicles and recycling centres. Most of us would have seen reports of the huge fires at recycling centres over the years and many have taken place in Lincolnshire. The source of a number of these incidents has been the disposal of batteries or items containing batteries being placed in household bins and igniting on sites where there is storage of mixed combustible items. The disposal of all batteries should be made through the suppliers of such products where you will find containers specific to that purpose. Any electrical items containing batteries should be taken to a Household Recycling Centre where they can be separated and disposed of safely. It's that time of year again; the Flu Vaccination is available for this season 2018/2019 and appointments are currently being made for clinics. Flu can affect anyone but if you have a long-term health condition the effects of flu can make it worse even if the condition is well managed and you normally feel well. You should have the free flu vaccine if you are: • pregnant or have a long term condition such as: • a heart problem • a chest complaint or breathing difficulties, including bronchitis, emphysema or severe asthma • a kidney disease • lowered immunity due to disease or treatment (such as steroid medication or cancer treatment) • liver disease • had a stroke or a transient ischaemic attack (TIA) • diabetes • a neurological condition, e.g. multiple sclerosis (MS), cerebral palsy or learning disability • a problem with your spleen, e.g. sickle cell disease, or you have had your spleen removed • are seriously overweight (BMI of 40 and above) This list of conditions isn't definitive.
